Opening Session: AIR status quo in Europe and Japan

Opening remarks by the organizers centered around the theme of how COVID-19 influenced the AIR sectors in Europe and Japan as well as key-notes by two specialists on the status quo in the sectors in Japan and Europe.

Concluded by a Q&A with questions from the audience moderated by the symposium's moderator **Jun'ichiro Ishii.**

Individual artist since 2004, Jun'ichiro Ishii has worked in more than 20 countries, mainly Asia, the Middle East, and Europe. VILLA KUJOYAMA

Perched high above Kyoto, Villa Kujoyama is a pluridisciplinary arts residency which, since 1992, welcomes established and emerging artists seeking to work on a project in connection with Japan. Since its founding, close to 400 artists have spent time at the Villa Kujoyama and helped to promote intercultural dialogue through artistic and intellectual exchanges – and contemporary creation.

Today's Villa Kujoyama is one of France's most prestigious overseas art residencies, managed in coordination with Institut Français – the cultural arm of the Ministry of European and Foreign Affairs. It plays a driving role in encouraging mobility among practitioners through research programmes that are designed to promote a greater understanding of disciplines, from traditional hand-crafts to digital creation, not forgetting the visual and performing arts.

With the support of its principal patron since 2014, the Fondation Bettencourt Schueller, day after day Villa Kujoyama implements an ambitious project in synergy with numerous professionals across multiple sectors.

COETHE-INSITUTVILLAKAMOGAWA

Villa Kamogawa was installed in 2011 in the existing building of Goethe-Institut in Kyoto. During the last almost 10 years, the villa hosted 130 artists and researchers from Germany, in the disciplines architecture, crafts and design, literature, film, visual arts, performing arts and music, including digital ways of artistic expression.

The three-month stay is both inspiration and artistic orientation for the fellows. In direct exchange with the local cultural scene, they create projects and new concepts.

In this way, the well-known intercultural dialogue is expanded: to include the perspective of working together, to learn new working methods and new materials and to create sustainable working relations between cultural institutions and creators from Japan and Cermany.
