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ANNOUNCING THE 2025 VILLA KUJOYAMA RESIDENCIES

Institut français and Institut français du Japon are pleased to announce Villa Kujoyama's new residents.

On June 20, Villa Kujoyama's final jury gathered and selected 14 projects led by 17 artists, who will be spending 4 to 6 months in residence in 2025.

Applications for Villa Kujoyama's 2025 residencies were open to French or foreign artists and creators living in France for a minimum of 5 years, and to Japanese artists based in Japan in pairs with French artists or foreign artists based based in France for more than 5 years. Those artists had to propose an original and singular research project, requiring a stay of immersion and research in Japan. This year, for the first time, the call for applications was also open to scientists in duo or pairs with artists.

250 applications were received for a total of 293 artists and creators
